RE: Legal Opinion Regarding Miami Today: Meeting Request Regarding Legal Advertising

Date: July 14, 2015

Sec. 50.011, F.S. sets out where legal notices may be published and states, in pertinent part:

"...a publication in a newspaper printed and published periodically once a week or oftener, containing at least 25 percent of its words in the English language, entered or qualified to be admitted and entered as periodicals matter at a post office in the county where published, for sale to the public generally, available to the public generally for the publication of official or other notices and customarily containing information of a public character or of interest or of value to the residents or owners of property in the county where published, or of interest or of value to the general public." (Amended in 1999 after AGO 96-44)

Sec 50.031, F.S. set out further, in pertinent part:

"...shall have been published for the prescribed period of time required for such publication, in a newspaper which at the time of such publication shall have been in existence for 1 year and shall have been entered as periodicals matter at a post office in the county where published, or in a newspaper which is a direct successor of a newspaper which together have been so published." (Amended in 1999 after AGO 96-44)

Some recent AG Opinions on the matter state as follows:

AGO 2012-11: "A newspaper which has not been published on a weekly or more often schedule for one year prior to the first publication of a legal notice would not qualify for publication of a legal notice pursuant to Chapter 50, Florida Statutes."

AGO 2002-70 "Publication of legal notices by a municipality must comply with the requirements of sections 50.011 and 50.031, Florida Statutes, which require, among other things, that the newspaper must be entered as periodical matter at the post office. A pending application to be entered as periodical matter would not satisfy the requirements of the statute."

AGO 96-44 "I am of the opinion that in light of the reclassification of "second-class" mail as "periodicals" mail by the United States Postal Service, effective July 1, 1996, eligibility for the "periodicals" postal category satisfies the requirement in sections 50.031 and 50.051, Florida Statutes, that legal notices and process be published in a newspaper entered as "second-class" mail matter at the post office."

Whether Miami Today qualifies will depend on the specifics of their publication schedule and whether they are considered a periodical by the post office; as I think it does fulfill the requirement of being available to the public generally and of being of interest/value to the general public.
